Safety Corner:

Aviation Investigation Final Report Location: Tracy, California Date and Time: April 24, 2023, 13:45 Local EXPRESS Aircraft Damage: Minor Defining Event: Loss of control on ground Injuries: None

Analysis

The pilot reported that, during the takeoff roll, the airplane drifted to the left, and he corrected with right brake input. The airplane began drifting left again, and the pilot was unable to correct with right rudder or brake. The airplane briefly became airborne and then landed in the grass to the left of the runway. The airplane sustained substantial damage to the engine mount. The pilot reported that there were no pre-accident mechanical malfunctions or failures with the airplane that would have precluded normal operation.

Probable Cause and Findings

The National Transportation Safety Board determines the probable cause(s) of this accident to be: The pilot's failure to maintain directional control during the takeoff roll.

This is a reminder to be cautious when operating high performance aircraft. Getting proper training and avoiding bad habits is the best way to prevent this type of accident.
